

What happens in school?

When your child uses the internet in school they will be supervised. The school computers have a filtering and blocking system to limit access to inappropriate sites.

Click Clever Click Safe code:



ZIP IT

Keep your personal stuff private and think about what you say and do online.



BLOCK IT

Block people who send nasty messages and don't open unknown links and attachments.



FLAG IT

Flag it up with someone you trust if anything upsets you or if someone asks to meet you offline.

Concerns about what to do

Here are a few suggestions on what to do and look out for and how you can help as a parent/carer.

What are they doing?

Get to know how your child uses the internet, and ensure you always know what they are doing whilst using it.

Monitoring

Put the computer in a family room so you can easily monitor how it is being used. Remember internet access is available on smart TV's, mobiles and games consoles.

Going to the wrong site

Think about filtering out inappropriate sites and encourage your child to be careful when spelling web addresses.

Filtering and blocking

Remember that filtering is never as good as adult supervision, so try and supervise them where possible.

Getting addicted

Encourage your child to have a balanced approach to life and not spend all of their time on the computer.



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Commercialism

Set up a family e-mail address for your child to use to enter competitions or for using as a newsletter email address.

Cyber bullying

You can empower your child to stand up to bullies, encourage them to report any incidents.
